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The Judges Decision

SCORING TARGETS IN THE AIR PISTOL MATCH

This issue I am going to cover the two methods of scoring paper targets for the Air Pistol matches. For the purpose of this article we are going to use one shot per target which is what the ISSF rule book talks about. However whether it is one, two or five shots per target the same rules apply to deciding the value of a shot on a target.

The first method is the old method of using gauges. When you pick up a bunch of targets to score the first thing you should do is cast an eye over them to see that each target only has one shot in it. At the same time you would also note any target that may need to be gauged. As you score each target you write the value of the shot on the target.

Now on target four of the ten targets you are scoring there is a shot in the 8 ring that appears to touch the 9 ring, an outward scoring gauge will be inserted into the hole (a description of how to read this gauge correctly can be found on page 269 paragraph 6.7.15.6.2 of the current ISSF rule book).

You and a second person will look at the gauge if you both agree on the value then record that value and continue on. If however you disagree then a third person must view the target with the gauge still inserted, (DO NOT REMOVE GAUGE UNTIL VALUE IS DECIDED, the third person will either say it is in or it is out this will then give you two out of three with the same value.

That value is then recorded on the target, you also need to mark the target to indicate that the shot has been gauged this is done by drawing a line around the shot to indicate whether the shot is included or excluded from the 9 ring.

The second method is using the RIKA target reading machine. In this description we will use the same bunch of targets however in real life this would not be done.

To start with I will explain briefly how the RIKA works. The RIKA scans each target as it is fed into the machine; it reads the rings on the target it will also register that there is a hole in the target. Through the software in the machine it relates where the hole is in the target and the scoring rings, thus giving that shot a value.

Now as we feed the targets into the machine and we get to target four that has the shot that we believe to be a nine, we feed this target in and the machine registers an eight.

We then put that target to one side and continue on with the rest of the targets in that batch. We then take target four and rotate it 90 degrees clock wise and feed the target in to the machine again. This time the machine tells us that it is a nine. We again take the target and rotate it a further 90 degrees and feed it in again and it registers a nine, we now have three values or that shot 8, 9, 9. As in manual scoring we have two results that match thus the value for that shot is a nine.

You may ask why does this happen.
There are a number of elements that can lead to this situation they are as follows: - distortion in the printing of the target, dampness in the target, the angle that the shot went into the target, the shape of the hole. These are the main elements there may be others.

But by feeding the target in three different directions we are using the machine to give us three decisions on the shot as we did in the manual scoring system by using three people to adjudicate on the value of the shot.

I hope this clears up some of the mystery around scoring with the RIKA paper target reader.

From the Coaching Council

What do I have to do to shoot a good accurate shot?

You have to align the sights correctly in the aiming area, which will make the shot impact in the centre of the target and then cause the pistol to fire without miss-aligning the sights.

In previous articles we have discussed the basics and techniques required to deliver one accurate shot, now the next step is to develop a shot sequence to be followed for each and every shot.

Here is a basic example of such a sequence, although as you develop your own individual system, it may differ to some degree, to suit your own style of shooting.

SHOT SEQUENCE

- 1 Pick up the pistol - place carefully into shooting hand, using non-shooting hand.
- 2 Check grip - that sights are naturally aligned.
- 3 Assume stance - check if aligned correctly with target. Adjust if necessary.
- 4 Take one or two comfortably deep breaths.
- 5 Extend arm and pick up focus on sights.
- 6 Extend natural respiratory pause whilst settling into aiming area.
- 7 Begin initial trigger pressure.
- 8 Maintain sight alignment.
- 9 Increase positive, rearward trigger pressure.
- 10 Concentrate on sight alignment.
- 11 Shot breaks during continued trigger pressure and constant alignment of sights.

- 12 Follow through on all the basics.
- 13 Recall the sight picture at the moment of shot break.
- 14 Recall the method of trigger release.
- 15 Analyse and nominate the shot.
- 16 Check the analysis. Correct where necessary.

A shooter will become a champion if he/she analyses and corrects mistakes every time a shot is fired.

SHOT ANALYSIS

1. Check all aspects of follow through.
2. Describe the sight alignment, as it appeared when shot broke.
3. Recall details of trigger release.
4. Nominate shot position as result from 2 and 3.
5. Compare target hit location with shot call.
6. If target hit is good or bad, determine cause.
7. Watch for error pattern to form.
8. Did the shot break in normal holding area?
9. Did you hold too long?
10. Did you apply positive rearward pressure?
11. Did you maintain concentration throughout the shot release?
(What did you think about, other than sight alignment?)
12. Were you concerned about results?
(Score)
13. Make positive solution statements in your shooting diary, in order to ensure a technically correct delivery.

Do not neglect analysing your GOOD shots! This is just as, if not more, important than analysing mistakes. You must KNOW how you fired those good shots, the way they feel and how to duplicate them, again and again.

There is no secret to winning pistol matches. A correct application of the fundamentals will result in a perfection of performance that will give the shooter exacting control of his actions.

2005 International 1920 Match Victorian Championships

Mildura Pistol Club again hosted the International 1920 Match State championships. Competitors from Victoria, South Australia and the A.C.T. enjoyed two days of intense competition in rather kind conditions. Mildura certainly knows how to order the weather for their competitions, two days of cloudless skies with gentle breezes.

A couple of hardy souls decided to camp on the range. Although the days were quite pleasant it was freezing at night! Competition started with most Open Class competitors shooting Practical, Mover and Plates on the Saturday, making for a nice early finish on the Sunday.

By the end of Saturday the competition is wide open with Charles Kerner, Murray Ray and Tom Whitehead all in with a chance, with only four points separating them.

Charles Kerner continued his good shooting from Saturday to win the Open event and clinch his first State Title. Charles is also the first Victorian to win the title for a number of years. Charles won the title with 1916/161x from Murray Ray on 1916/155x with Tom Whitehead taking third place with 1912/156x.

Mary Curnow from the ACT took the Ladies Championship while Nathan Tait was the Junior Champion.

The Metallic sight class proved to be a popular event with over 20 entries. Barry Marsh from SA won the title with 1829/114x with Tom Whitehead in second and Zeljko Cvetnic taking third place. The Falling Plate event in the most unforgiving in the Metallic Sight class. At least on the paper targets a shot 5 mm outside the ten ring scores eight, on the plates the same shot scores zero, a fairly hefty sort of penalty.

Congratulations to all the winners and all competitors on a great championships.



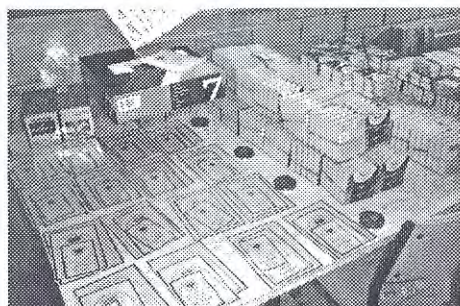

During the Queens birthday long weekend, the Victorian Junior team competed at the Annual National Tri State. The competition was held at the Sydney Pistol Club located in the suburbs and surrounded by ocean and coastal views.

The Victorian team flew in from Avalon on Friday evening and was greeted at the club with the New South Wales team. The South Australian Team arrived the following day.

After a late night and very limited sleep, all the Junior Shooters had a hot breakfast then started the days shooting practice. Air pistol in the morning then some lunch then back onto the ranges to shoot sport pistol.

Once the practice was over and then heavy rain had stopped each state named their team and captains (captain Christian Boyle and vice Seb Hume) before a roast dinner then an outing to Luna Park in Sydney. The outing to Luna Park was certainly not the highlight of the weekend.

The next morning everyone was up early with hot breakfast again getting prepared to shoot the two competitions. Two details were scheduled, being air pistol and sport pistol. After the first detail was lunch, which was hot dogs then the second detail and finally presentation and dinner.

The final results placed New South Wales team in first place with a total score of 8919 followed closely by Victoria Team 8594 then South Australia 4447.

The Victorian team had a long sleep in on Monday morning, getting up at 3:30am to catch a plane back to Melbourne. So for half an hour in the dark and cold we packed up all our gear and got ready to leave.

After a sleep on the flight home the team returned from a fantastic weekend of shooting, good food and laughs.



Proposed Changes to Disposal of Firearms.

Licencing Services Branch has advised that the information being distributed with Licence Renewals is incorrect. The correct information is detailed below.

Please note that the accompanying Renewal Application Guidelines brochure states that a licence holder has 28 days to dispose of their firearms from licence expiry date if they do not renew their licence before this time.

This is incorrect and is in the process of being amended.

The disposal information should read:

Licence holders who do not renew their licence before the licence expiry date **MUST** dispose of their firearms by this date. Disposal can be either by -

1. Sale to or through a Licensed Firearms Dealer; or
2. Surrender to a police station for destruction only.

Note: You **cannot** simply give or sell your firearm(s) to another licence holder. If you want to give or sell your firearm(s) to another licence holder –

The receiver must first obtain a Permit to Acquire a Firearm (for each firearm);

Both of you must go with the firearm(s) and the Permit to Acquire to a Licensed

Firearms Dealer who will act as an agent in the transaction;

The transaction must occur before the expiry date of your licence. If the transaction cannot be completed before your licence expires, the firearm(s) must either be sold to a Licensed Firearms Dealer or transferred into the Dealer's name for the period between your licence expiry and the other person's acquisition of the firearm(s).

You must not be in possession of firearms after your licence expires or you will be in breach of the Firearms Act 1996 and subject to the penalties of the Act.

Once you have disposed of your firearm(s), please advise Licensing Services Division of the disposal details either by telephone on 03 9247 5775 between 8am and 4pm Monday to Friday, or by emailing licensing@police.vic.gov.au

This will prevent police members from attending at your address to seize firearms.

Castlemaine Black Powder Open

A good roll up of shooters for the Castlemaine Black Powder Open. Many people would be familiar with the extreme heat endured during Castlemaines February ISSF open. Let me assure you that Castlemaine in June is nothing like Castlemaine in February.

In June it is absolutely freezing. The most popular spot was in front of the heater and soup was the order of the day in the canteen. Some of the headgear worn by the competitors was unusual to say the least. Out on the ranges the competition was hot. Noel Ryan showed he is still a force in the 25 metre event, winning with 374.

Remember it was only 25 years ago that Noel established the current Victorian record of 378. John Sammartino won the 50 metre event, while Dennis Martin (NSW) won three of the four International matches, with Stuart Dunbar winning the Modern Single Shot event.

A couple of competitors tried to shoot International match with flintlock pistols. The rules for Black Powder International Matches are 13 shots in 30 minutes, with the best 10 shots to score. At the end of the 30 minutes our two flintlock competitors had managed a total of five shots between the two of them. No wonder the old wars took so long to complete!

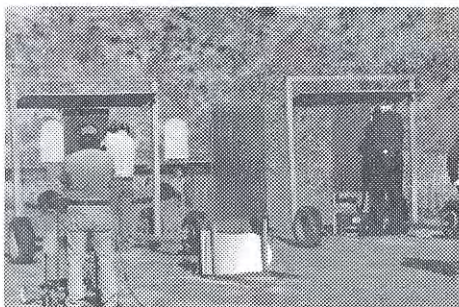

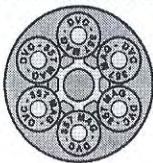
