Management Matters

Welcome all members, and new members; we hope you are settling in ok. This month I will talk about Storage, which is topical at the moment with local DFO's and police checking storage practices in the rural areas and in pockets of Metro, I believe they are checking around Frankston area at the moment. Members please attend to your storage regulations and lock everything up in its appropriate place.

If you hold a firearms Licence you do NOT need to be licensed to store safety cartridges, primers and propellant in quantities of not more than:

Class 1.1C Propellant Powder/
Smokeless powder 20kg

Class 1.1D Gunpowder/Black Powder
5kg

Class 1.4S Percussion Caps, Capped cartridge cases may be stored provided they are kept in the original packaging as supplied.

Primers 10,000 and Cartridges 40,000.

These regulations are from the Dangerous Goods ACT (Explosives) with thanks to Gary who provided up to date information.

The previous year has been a full-on period with some new personnel starting and doing a great job.

There are new innovations under way and we need to increase our membership overall with particular attention to coaching and range officers and judges.

Our teams have done well in the various National competitions as you would have seen in our team managers reports.

Thanks to the Executive for their input and effort over the year ,without their help I could not have any hope of achieving anything, well done Peter, Geoff, Bob, John, Sharon. Also to the Sports Development Officer Paul and Technical Inspector Clive. New Editor of VPN

First of all let me say 'hi' as I am new in this role

this month. I am taking over as editor in helping produce a great newsletter/magazine for Victorian pistol shooters.

I am a member at Mountain District Pistol Club in the Yarra Valley, in Melbourne's outer east where I shoot ISSF, some Service plus a little Single Action for fun. I also produce the club's newsletter "Mountain District Range News".

To give you a little background; I started shooting in 1975 in a small town in New Zealand where, initially, Air Pistol was the main event. It was fun but really basic; using the back storeroom of a members shop we met



every Thursday night and had some fun. I used a very basic Crossman Mk 1 powered by powerlet compressed air bulbs. Others used Gecados and Walthers and a few lucky ones had a Feinwerkbau 65.

We built an outdoor range in a local

quarry very close to town and started with Free Pistol (50m Pistol) where mine was a Drulov. The rules on firearms were different in those days – air pistols weren't registered and following a probation period where air pistol was compulsory then we could get a handgun licence and were allowed to shoot .22 single shot Free Pistol. ISSF was known as ISU in those days. Several of us became qualified range officers and I also became an armourer. In those days a handgun licence did not allow you to store guns, just carry and use them. The armourers had to store the guns for the members.

After building a dividing wall at the range we introduced the other ISU 25metre matches Standard, Rapid and Centrefire. My interest was Rapid fire with a Walther OSP and full wrap

around grip using .22 shorts at targets the size of coffin lids. It was great fun. Though the wrap around grip eventually became illegal. Standard Pistol was shot using an old Bernardelli and Centrefire with an Astra .357 magnum. Our club in a town of 35,000 people grew and members participated nationally.

Something that may be of interest; a family of shooters owned the local petrol station and became seriously involved in the club. The father, Geoff, taught me reloading on a RCBS Rock chucker press, casting my own projectiles over a gas burner. The sons were young, one Warren, a junior just starting out. The family were the Potters who in later years moved to Australia and founded Potter Firearms. Young Warren has gone on to represent

both New Zealand and Australian in ISSF matches – now living in USA writing about shooting for Pilguns.

I left the sport in 1979 to pursue other things including moving to Melbourne.

In 2012 my son (a keen hunter) and I decided to have a look at the pistol shooting scene. After some research and, with difficulty, we found some clubs not too far from our home in the outer east of Melbourne. We made contact with Mountain District and after an introductory visit we joined. The differences to the sport are significant but considering the political landscape we are fortunate to have the wide range of matches and calibres to choose from. In the 70s in NZ there was no Service, ICORE or IPSC and certainly no Single Action. So as a member today our choices are wide open. I will say it is sad that the

excitement of big calibres seems to have a detrimental effect on most new members trying to learn sight alignment and trigger control – there was sure something about starting out on an air pistol.

My intention is to try and regain some of my old skills of Rapid fire with a more modern Pardini but without the wrap around grip and no 22 shorts. And the targets are smaller. Also Standard and Centre fire where fewer rules have changed over the years. My new challenge is to pick up Service where the same skills are required, plus the need for varying speeds on multiple targets. One extra thing I have found to enjoy is attending Open Competitions. I recommend them for added experience and meeting other shooters at all levels.

I am very pleased to be back in the pistol shooting fraternity and look forward to meeting many of you at Opens. I would ask you to help me to make this the best shooting newsletter possible; send me adverts for your clubs events, send me jokes and funny occurrences, send me stories about your experiences, and send lots of pictures. Judges Corners

Have been asked by several members, 'that now we only have one target visible in 50m Pistol what is the correct height and are there any tolerances'?

6.4.6.1 Height of Target Centres

Target centres must be within the following heights when measured from the level of the firing point floor:

Range	Standard Height	Variation Allowable
50m	0.75 m	+/- 0.50 m
25m	1.40 m	+0.10 m / - 0.20 m

All target centres within a group of targets or range must have the same height (± 1 cm).

The above information can be found on page 213 of the rule book.

Please note that all heights are measured from the firing point floor not at the target line, and are to the centre of the target. As can be seen above the nominal height is 0.75m with a variation of 0.5m higher or lower than the nominal height. This means that the centre of the target can fall in the range of 0.25m to 1.25m. With the minimal size of the 50m target being 0.55m in

height this means the bottom of the target if placed on a frame that is at 0.25m above the firing point would in actual fact be 0.025m below the firing point floor.

At the other end of the height tolerance of 1.25m this is 0.15m below the nominal height for 25m targets.

Where is this all leading to,? It is leading to where do clubs put the target for 50m Pistol when they have target frames that allow for 2 targets one above the other and the target frames have been set up to have the target at the right height for the 25m events of 1.4m above the firing point floor.

If the target frames have been made correctly the centre of the top target will be 1.4m with the lower target being set at 0.75m below that of the top target. If we do the maths on this $1.4 - 0.75 = 0.65$ m above the firing point floor for the centre of the lower target, well within the tolerance for the target height at 50m.

The result being that when the frames are at the 50m line the target goes on the lower frame position, when these frames are at the 25m line then the target goes on the higher frame position

resulting in the correct height for the 25m events. The end result of all of this is that the dual target frames do not have to be altered to meet the required target heights.

Glasgow! After 24 hours flying and 5 hours on the train it is wonderful to finally be here. After checking in to a hotel and getting a much needed night's sleep it is a case of "Let the Games begin". Victoria has 2 team members in the pistol team – Bruce Quick will be shooting 50m Pistol and Rapid Fire, while Lalita Yauleuskaya will shoot both the

The first port of call is UAC (Uniform & Accreditation Centre). I am here as an Australian International Technical Official – in other words a jury member – so to validate my accreditation I present my Australian passport. Oops! All non EU passports are being scanned by the Home Office and I don't have an entry stamp! Clearly Australians are notorious for this as I am immediately asked

tidy as I like! We are a short bus ride away from shops, restaurants etc but our accreditation gives us free travel & the buses are frequent. Dinner is also available on site.

Next day is our first sight of the Barry Budden shooting range – and it is not propitious. We all feel as if we were walking on to a building site. With the first day of competition 2 days away there is a mass of work to do. However, the ranges are ready and look just like the London 2012 ranges – probably

because they are basically all the same equipment. The branding has changed of course, and the spectator areas are nowhere near finished but the athletes are already there getting in some training. There is no Finals Hall at this event which is going to make a lot of work for the range crews. Paul Gumm from Wales is the CRO for all rifle and pistol finals and over the next 3 days he runs a number of “test” finals to make sure everything will work. His experience in this role during the 2012 Olympics is paying off here.

On the 2nd day we get a 12.30 finish as most of us are being bussed back to Glasgow for the Opening Ceremony. A few sensible souls forgo the opportunity but I am not one of them – although I may regret it at 5am next morning! Although the Scots suffered from cultural cringe during the first part of the ceremony I thought it was quite clever – the entire ceremony was excellent and included an aging Rod Stewart, a nervous Susan Boyle, a visit from the queen, pipes, drums, opera singing, flag raising, a UNICEF appeal during the athlete entry and a minute silence for MH17. Not so good was the 2 hour bus trip home – although I am told I zonked out and slept the whole way!! I really can't remember.

Australia is having mixed success here. In the full-bore competition a cross fire at 1000yds gave England an unexpected “bull” while in women's skeet Lara Coles took out the gold medal. Lalita dipped out in 4th position in her air competition, but Daniel took out gold

in his. Over on the 25m range Lalita shot a marathon bronze medal match in the 25m pistol final, coming from 4 points down to take out the bronze medal. Daniel and Bruce both made the 50m final, and Bruce and David Chapman are in the RF Final. The Games finish on a high note with David taking the gold medal in Rapid Fire.

Events such as the Commonwealth Games don't just happen. It takes years of planning and preparation, hundreds of volunteers in myriad roles, technical officials for all sports, cooperation with government, immigration, police, transport etc. It is an honour to have been selected as a jury member for these games; it has also been wonderful catching up with colleagues from around the world. Senate Enquiry Would Effect Handguns

Below is a copy of what is before the Senate regarding our handguns. Follow it on line at http://www.aph.gov.au/Parliamentary_Business/Committees/Senate/Legal_and_Constitutional_Affairs/Illicit_firearms The heading is seemingly quite innocent; to eliminate gun-related violence but their view seems based on their belief that all firearms should be eliminated.

The ability of Australian law enforcement authorities to eliminate gun-related violence in the community.

On 19 June, the Senate referred the following matter to the Legal and Constitutional Affairs References Committee for inquiry and report:

The ability of Australian law enforcement authorities to eliminate gun-related violence in the community, with reference to:

- A. the estimated number, distribution and lethality of illegal guns, including both outlawed and stolen guns, in Australia;
- B. the operation and consequences of the illicit firearms trade, including both outlawed and stolen guns within Australia;
- C. the adequacy of current laws and resourcing to enable law enforcement authorities to respond to technological advances in gun technology, including firearms made from parts which have been imported separately or covertly to avoid detection, and firearms made with the use of 3D printers;
- D. the extent to which the number and types of guns stolen each year in Australia increase the risk posed to the safety of police and the community, including the proportion of gun-related crime involving legal firearms which are illegally held;
- E. the effect banning semi-automatic handguns would have on the number of illegally held firearms in Australia;
- F. stricter storage requirements and the use of electronic alarm systems for guns stored in homes;
- G. the extent to which there exist anomalies in federal, state and territory laws regarding the ownership, sale, storage and transit across state boundaries of legal firearms, and how these laws relate to one another; and
- H. any related matters.
